

Clare summary - 2016

- ★ The Clare reported crush was 20,795 tonnes in 2016, 25% higher than the 2015 reported crush and 10% above the five year average of 18,895 tonnes.
- ★ The total value of grapes from the region increased by one third from \$18 million to \$24 million.
- The average prices for all the major varieties except Riesling increased – particularly Chardonnay and Shiraz.
- ★ There were 23 hectares of new plantings in 2015. These were offset by removals; total vineyard area decreased by 59 hectares to 5,216 hectares.
- * Average gross returns per hectare* for the major varieties ranged from under \$4,000 for Merlot to over \$5,000 for Riesling and Chardonnay. The average gross returns for whites were better than for reds due to higher yields.
- ★ Gross returns in 2016 were consistently higher than 2015 for all the major varieties and higher than 2014 for all except Merlot.

*calculated as total tonnes divided by plantings up to 2013, multiplied by weighted average price

Note: these gross return figures are conservative as only reported tonnes are included in the calculations. The non-response rate is estimated at 10% nationally. Bonus payments not known at the time of the survey are also not included.
