

Padthaway summary - 2016

- ★ The Padthaway reported crush was 44,922 tonnes in 2016, the highest since 2008 and 42% above the five year average of 31,723 tonnes.
- ★ The total value of grapes from the region increased by 80% from \$21 million to \$38 million.
- ★ Despite large increases in volume, the average price for most of the major varieties increased – particularly the reds.
- ★ There were just 8 hectares of new plantings reported in 2015, while the total vineyard area decreased by 75 hectares to 3,980 hectares.
- Average gross returns per hectare* for the major varieties ranged from just over \$7000 for Chardonnay to over \$20,000 for Pinot Gris – due to the very high yields.
- Average gross returns in 2016 were significantly higher than in the previous two years for all the major varieties.

*calculated as total tonnes divided by plantings up to 2013, multiplied by weighted average price

Note: these gross return figures are conservative as only reported tonnes are included in the calculations. The non-response rate is estimated at 10% nationally. Bonus payments not known at the time of the survey are also not included.
